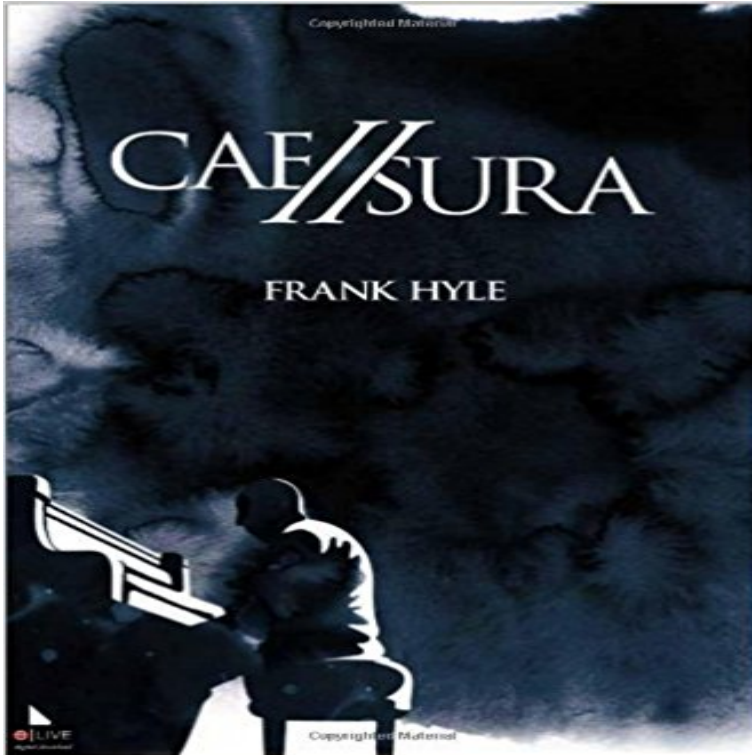


Caesura
