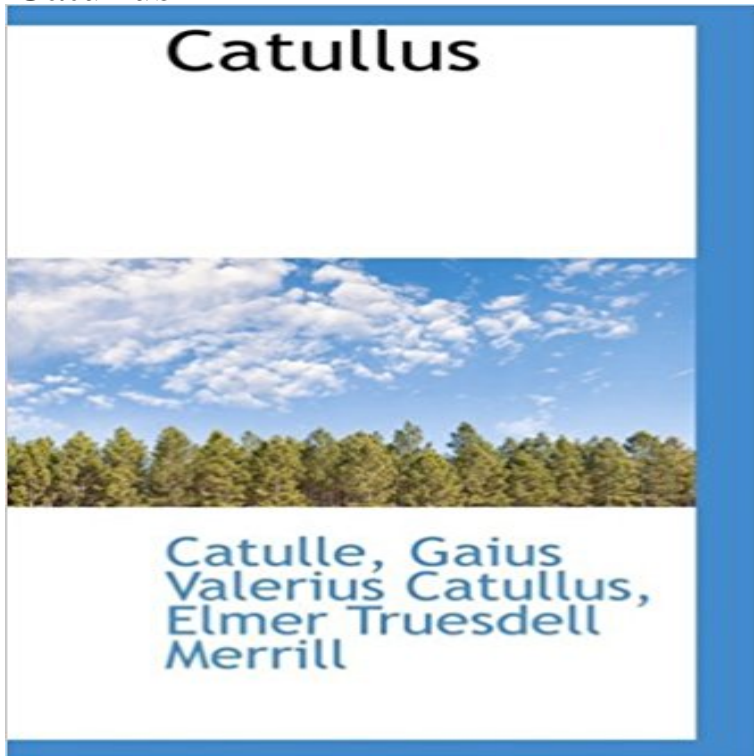


Catullus
