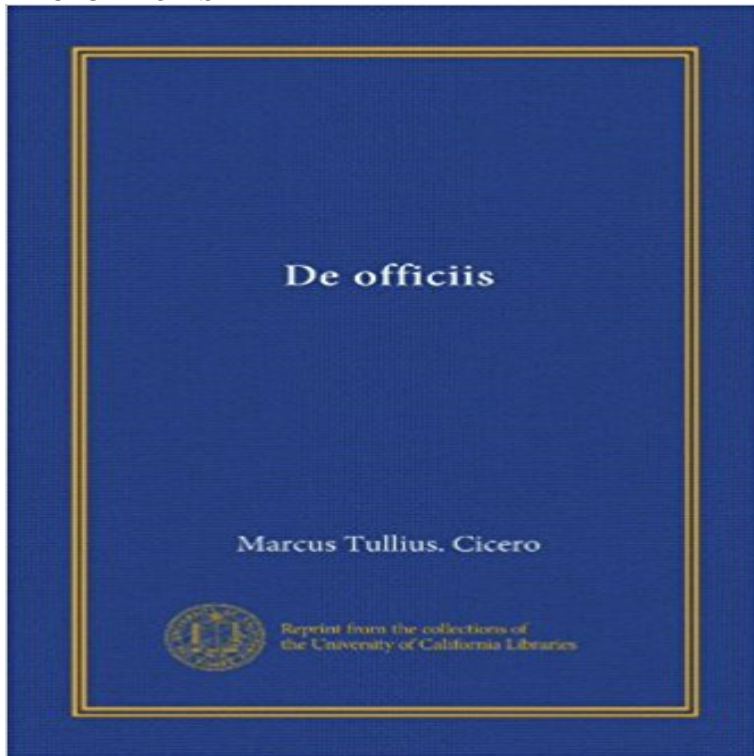


## De officiis
